It's around a hundred to a hundred and fifty thousand every year. And this would allow us to be able to utilize those funds for potentially different things in the future than what we have been doing. So it's just renewing that and we're just following what they would have asked us to do.

And then on February 15th of 2022, a resolution was passed by council authorizing the city manager into a contract with GovOS as our chosen software provider. And since the time we've been working with GovOS implementing a software solution at this time they're hopeful to go live sometime in July of 2022. And just as today, we're looking at July 29th as a go live date, as long as we get all the training in prior to that. And we're suggesting to waive the penalty for the late filing fees for one year, after we implement the GovOS system, since this is a fair and equitable request to the fact that this is a brand new process for affected property owners, and we wanna make sure there's this smooth transition as issues come up during the implementation of this type of process. Thank you.

But in reality, not everyone knows about it and with going with GovOS we'll be sending letters out to everyone. You've been identified as a short term rental provider, by the way we have this estimated tax that you owe, but you can imagine if you didn't really know it was coming and you've had to have six months worth of tax and oh, it can be alarming, and what we're trying to do is this first year is kind of soften that message. Hey, if you're a short term rental provider, we're gonna be doing this tax, we're hoping to collect it quarterly not monthly so that Joe's team doesn't have to kind of track it down every month and then in our view, waiving the penalties for just a year allows us to have a smooth transition and then one year after implementation, then we would institute late fees for anyone not paying is the way we're thinking.

0:10:03.9 Mr. Prytherch: So people should be aware of the tax, they should be collecting it as part of the fees that they're charging.

So we have not done very much communication to inform them of this new law, we were hoping to be with GovOS sooner in the year, to be honest and it's just taken us a lot longer than we thought to get this new program ready. And so there are probably a fair amount of people who are doing a short term rental, who are not aware that they have this tax and they're gonna be taken by surprise, and so we wanna give them some time to get that ready to go.

I think that was my confusion 'cause I knew we weren't actually really collecting yet or pushing that issue, and I knew there was sort of two sides and one is letting them know and giving them a fair chance. And then also on our side, are we ready to start collecting system.

So I think there are people who are gonna be surprised, but that's what this whole new system is for, is it identifies them for us, it has a calendar tracking for us, it sends letters for us. So it's a really wonderful robust system, but it's taken us a very long time to get ready to implement it. But we're this close.

0:11:10.6 Mr. Prytherch: And the fee itself is not insignificant. It's like 10% plus an additional 1% so that part we're waiving.

I think many of us have felt great frustration and sadness in the parade of mass shootings that we've had in the United States, it's been numbing such that in Uvalde it was terrible but not shocking because it's not the worst. I mean, I think in Newtown we were blown away, such a thing could happen, and now we know such things are part of unfortunately the fabric of life in the United States. And so, and people, I think look to their local governments to say, "What can you do?" And unfortunately in Ohio, what local governments can do is really very little, at one level it makes sense because our local laws shouldn't conflict with general laws, such if you were a concealed carry permit holder, for example, moving between jurisdictions, it would be really confusing. So there's a certain logic, but I think that our state particular state government that also federal government in the fact that we're not able to act, we have to hope that they do. And I think that there's a lot of debate about this, but unfortunately the only policy solution I see, particularly from our state legislature is to add more guns to the system, make it easier for people to carry them...

0:13:08.2 Mr. Prytherch: Put them in schools with people who have had 24 hours of training. And it's one answer, I guess it has a certain logic to it. But in a country that's awash in guns, I think they say they're more guns than there are citizens in the United States now, or... It's only a part of the solution. So I wish that we locally and other states cities have enacted their own ordinances. They're able to take some local action but in lieu of that, I think we just have to ask and plead that our state and federal lawmakers do something. And if you're up from Ohio, the do-something resonates because it was in 2019 that I guess since Connor Betts shot 19 people in Dayton. Luckily he was killed relatively quickly, but he killed nine people and wounded, 17 others and again, that's just one data point in a sea of mass shootings. 250 mass shootings in the United States in 2022 alone, and it's only June 21st.

But I think that... I think common sense people look at assault style firearms and wonder. I think they look at the fact that 18 -year-olds can purchase assault style firearms, and they wonder, high capacity magazines, bump stocks, universal background checks, mental health checks with a required waiting period, a universal database and closing the loophole, so people could just can't sell guns to each other. It just makes common sense. It wouldn't solve all the problems, but it would do something. So I had just asked that and I think we asked our legislators to do something.

But some predictions, we may have 20 to 30 days above 100 in the Midwest by the end of the century which is our children's lifetime. I am so excited about the water softening system, and I'm really excited that we're not making the pipeline because I think that this in the end is the more proactive, better choice as far as we might not have the big resilience with the greater water supply. But the fact that we will not have these chemicals in this town is so awesome. I mean, EPA's not even regulating it and they're coming out with more and more studies of how bad it is and how long it stays and the damage on the body. So I'm just really proud. And so I just wanna say, thank you for both those things. On that note, we will, do you have a motion to adjourn?

Thank you for creating and considering the "Do Something" resolution imploring state and federal government to address gun violence by enacting common sense gun laws. I am very much in favor of the resolution. I was doing research a few weeks ago to determine if, in fact, municipalities such as Oxford could enact its own gun legislation because state and federal entities have declined to do anything meaningful; I was surprised to find that Ohio laws do not allow municipalities to set their own gun laws. This makes the proposed resolution the only course of action for cities and I hope that more cities and counties consider such resolutions. What I appreciate about the resolution is that it gives specific examples of legislation that should be enacted and that such legislation, if enacted at the state and federal level, would bring about meaningful change. Unfortunately our state legislature has taken contrary actions, most recently evidenced by the reduction in the number of hours of training required for school personnel to carry guns, if approved by individual school boards, from over 700 hours to 24 hours. In separate legislation they removed the requirement for training and licensing of those carrying concealed weapon . These state actions are not helpful, quite the contrary. I am very hopeful that you, the City Council, will pass this resolution on June 21st

RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION APPROVING AN AMENDED APPLICATION FOR A “DESIGNATED OUTDOOR REFRESHMENT AREA” AND ESTABLISHING A DESIGNATED OUTDOOR REFRESHMENT AREA IN THE CITY OF OXFORD, OHIO.

WHEREAS, Amended Section 4301.82 of the Ohio Revised Code permits a municipality with a population of fifty thousand or less to create a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area within its corporate limits; and

WHEREAS, on May 31, 2022 the City Manager filed an application with City Council for approval of an Amended Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area in a specified area of the City described in the application; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 4301.82 (C) of the Ohio Revised Code, notice of the filing of the application for a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area was published in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Oxford on June 6, 2022 and on June 13, 2022; and

WHEREAS, Council received public comments on July 19, 2022 to consider the application; and

WHEREAS, City Council finds the application is in compliance with Section 4301.82(B) of the Ohio Revised Code and that the “Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area” to be created would be in compliance with Section 4301.82(D) of the Ohio Revised Code; and

WHEREAS, the approval of the Amended Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area will serve to enhance the experiences of patrons of City business establishments and the attendees of special events held within the City.

THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OXFORD, OHIO, HEREBY RESOLVES THAT:

SECTION 1: Council finds that the application meets the requirements of Section 4301.82 of the Ohio Revised Code and approves the application for the designation of certain property in the City as a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area.

SECTION 2: Council determines that all public notice requirements of Section 4301.82 of the Ohio Revised Code prior to the passage of this Resolution have been met.

SECTION 3: In order to ensure the public health and safety within the Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area, City Council establishes the following requirements:

- (a) The specific boundaries of the Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area, including street addresses, are described in the application attached hereto as Exhibit “A” and incorporated herein.

- (b) There shall be signs designating the boundary of the Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area (DORA). The number and location of the signs are described in the application attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein.
- (c) The DORA shall be in operation year round. The hours of operation shall be from 11 AM to 11 PM seven days per week. Special hours of DORA operation shall be allowed as designated in advance by the City Manager with the consent of City Council.
- (d) A Safety Plan has been developed to ensure public safety in the DORA, which may be implemented with existing staff. The Police Division shall be responsible for providing law enforcement services within the DORA. There shall be a minimum of one police officer available to patrol the area during hours of operation. In the event a larger than normal crowd is present in the DORA, the on duty supervisor may assign additional officers to patrol the area. For planned events in the DORA that may draw larger than normal attendance, the Chief of Police may have additional officers and/or other agency personnel assigned specifically to the area. The Fire Division shall be responsible for providing Fire, Rescue, and EMS within the DORA.
- (e) A Sanitation Plan has been developed to maintain the appearance and public health of the DORA, which may be implemented with existing staff. The Service Department shall be responsible for ensuring that all trash receptacles in the DORA are emptied regularly and are ample to handle generated waste. The proposed DORA cups shall be recyclable and biodegradable.
- (f) For purposes of the DORA, beer, wine, and intoxicating liquor shall be served solely in plastic cups that are distinctly marked.

SECTION 4: Five years from the effective date of this Resolution, and every five years thereafter, Council shall review the operation of the DORA herein established and shall either approve its continued operation or dissolve it.

SECTION 5: This Resolution shall take effect at the earliest date allowed by law.

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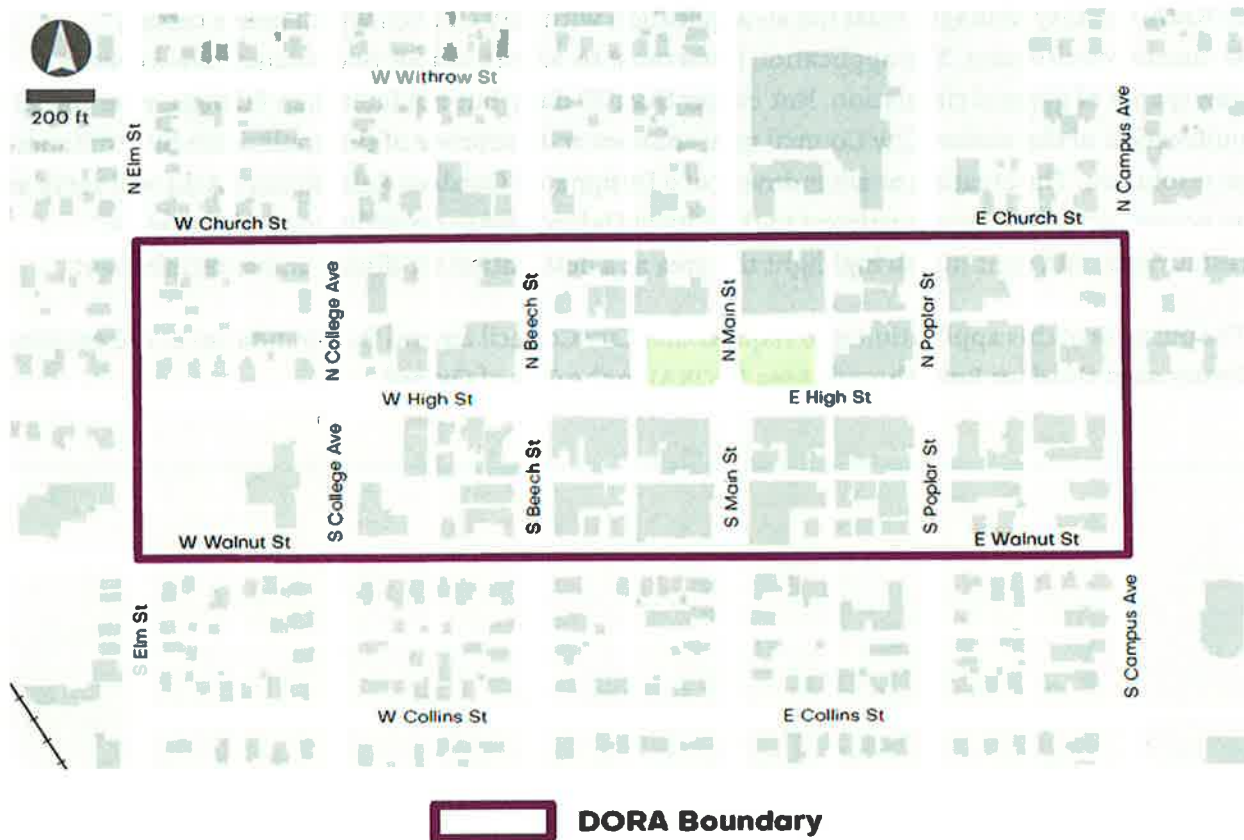
I. INTRODUCTION AND SUBMITTAL OF APPLICATION

Amended Section 4301.82 of the Ohio Revised Code (O.R.C.) authorizes, effective March 23, 2022, municipalities under 50,000 in population to create Designated Outdoor Refreshment Areas, or DORAs, limited to 320 contiguous acres in size. In order to consider the creation or amendment of a DORA, the City Manager must file an application with City Council which meets certain statutory requirement. The application filing must be advertised for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation. Not earlier than 30 days, but not later than 60 days, after initial publication of the notice, City Council may approve or disapprove of the application by ordinance or resolution. The creation or amendment of a Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area will serve as an economic tool to attract patrons to the City of Oxford, generate additional sales at local restaurants, and continue to highlight the area as a destination for dining and entertainment.

The purpose of this application is to request that City Council amend the boundaries of our existing Designated Outdoor Refreshment Area (DORA) in the City of Oxford.

II. BOUNDARIES (MAP)

In accordance with O.R.C. 4301.82(B)(1)(b), the amended boundaries of the proposed DORA are depicted below.



The boundaries defined by:

- South side of Church St. from Elm St. to Campus Ave. as the northern border
- West side of Campus Ave. from Church St. to Walnut St. as the eastern border
- North side of Walnut St. from to Campus Ave. to Elm St. as the southern border
- West side of Elm St. from Walnut St. to Church St. as the western border
- The zone includes all streets and parks within this boundary, approximately 40 acres

VII. PUBLIC HEALTH & SAFETY

The City of Oxford Service Department will be responsible for ensuring that all trash receptacles in the DORA are emptied regularly and are ample to handle generated waste. This will be accomplished through the current Rumpke contract, which is managed by the Service Department, as well as additional Service Department staff as needed. Each participating permit holder will be required to utilize and purchase special DORA cups, either biodegradable or other single use plastic, which will be supplied by the City or other local service entity at cost. Restrooms will be provided by the permit holders in the DORA zone.

The Police Division facility is within the DORA and routine patrols will enforce responsible behavior. The boundaries of the DORA will be strictly enforced. Boundary signage will be installed on the perimeter of the DORA. For planned events that may draw additional crowd, the Police Chief may have additional officers assigned specifically to the DORA.

A total of 24 signs will be posted to designate the DORA at;

- The SE corner of Church and Elm Streets (1), the SW and SE corners of Church St. and College Ave. (2), the SW and SE corners of Church and Beech Streets (2), the SW and SE corners of Church and Main Streets (2), the SW and SE corners of Church and Poplar Streets (2), the SW corner of Church Street and Campus Ave. (1)
- The NW and SW corners of Campus and High Streets (2), the NW corner of Campus and Walnut Streets (1)
- The NE and NW corners of Walnut and Poplar Streets (2), the NE and NW corners of Walnut and Main Streets (2), NE and NW corners of Walnut and Beech Streets (2), NE and NW corners of Walnut Street and College Ave. (2) and the NE corner of Walnut and Elm Street (1)
- The NE and SE corners of Elm and High Streets (2)

VIII. DATES & HOURS OF OPERATION

In accordance with O.R.C. 4301.82(F)(c) the proposed times of operations are as follows:

- The DORA will operate “year-round” with hours of operation from 11 AM to 11 PM, Monday to Sunday, 365 days per year.
- Special hours of DORA operation will be allowed as designated in advance by the City Manager with consent of City Council.

DISCUSSION:

LogCon Enterprises (DBA *Books & Brews*, now *Church Street Social*) entered into a 7-year, \$63,250 Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) agreement, at a three-percent interest rate, with the City of Oxford on May 6, 2019. This agreement was approved by Council on March 19, 2019 via Resolution No. 7053.

1. LogCon RLF Payment History
 - a. LogCon made all scheduled payments in full and on time from July 2019 through March 2020.
 - b. Via Resolution No. 7178 Oxford City Council suspended all RLF payments, recognizing financial hardships brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - i. LogCon halted payments at this time.
 - c. Via Resolution No. 7189 Oxford City Council voted to create a new RLF program, a five-thousand dollar Emergency Loan to assist local businesses with the continued challenges presented by the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - i. These Emergency Loans were awarded at a zero-percent interest rate, to be repaid over a four-year term.
 - ii. LogCon was a recipient of one of these Emergency Loans.
 - d. Via Resolution No. 7297 Oxford City Council voted to resume payments of all RLF agreements, including the newly created "Emergency Loans".
 - i. LogCon has not made any RLF loan payments since the suspension of payments, beginning in April 2020.

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The below information and recommendation are provided following a meeting with LogCon Enterprises on Friday, May 20, 2022 and approval of the CIC Board on Friday, June 24, 2022.

1. LogCon to begin repayment of the Emergency Loan beginning August 2022.
 - a. 48 payments of \$104.17
 - b. Amortization table for these payments attached.
2. The primary LogCon RLF agreement be amended, as follows;
 - a. Eliminate the interest portion of all RLF payments, applying all payments to the remaining principle of the initial loan agreement.
 - b. Resume payments following the previously establish number of payments, with 75 remaining billing cycles.
 - c. Payments to begin October 2022, allowing LogCon to capture additional revenue with the start of the Academic Year.
 - d. Amortization table for these payments attached.
3. City of Oxford staff recommend approval of this new payment agreement as it reflects LogCon Enterprises financial viability and allows the RLF to recover funds.

WHEREAS, the Oxford Community Improvement Corporation, after due deliberation, recommended approval of an amended amortization schedule for the remaining balance of the RLF loan in the amount of \$57,909.11 at zero percent (0%) interest over the seventy-five (75) remaining monthly payments, with the first payment to begin in October of 2022. DISCUSSION:

The City of Oxford was awarded \$2,420,796 from the American Rescue Plan Act to assist with the recovery from the coronavirus pandemic. Communities are encouraged to address the negative economic impacts that are result of COVID and address the disparity that was either exposed or exacerbated by the pandemic.

With our CARES funds, we were able to support the Family Resource Center and enable them to hire a case manager to assist with housing for their clients. This PT individual was able to assist 13 families in finding permanent housing.

We propose to provide the Family Resource Center \$25,000 of the American Rescue Plan Funds to continue to assist with their housing case management position. Long term, it is the City's hope that the short-term rental tax will provide enough income to assist with this position in the future.

Purpose:

The chairing of a City Commission requires a focus on making sure the Commission is set up to serve its purpose as effectively as possible. That being said, in order to ensure the continued service of the Student/Community Relations Commission (SCRC) in bringing together student and resident voices and advising the Oxford City Council, I and the approving Commission recommend the following changes to Chapter 139 of the Oxford Code of Ordinances. The proposed changes include both adjustments to reflect current practices, as well as new changes to improve SCRC's effectiveness in its roles as a City Commission. In particular, we have found the commission's size to be an inhibitor in setting meeting times that work for the whole commission, and we have often operated with only six or seven voting members present. We also felt it important to enshrine equal voting power for both students and residents, with four seats each.

Recommendation of the Student Community Relations Commission made on May 6, 2022

139.01 ESTABLISHED.

There is hereby created a Student/Community Relations Commission consisting of eight voting members and eleven ex-officio members.

139.02 COMPOSITION AND APPOINTMENT.

(a) The composition of the Commission and method of appointment thereto shall be as follows:

- (1) Four (4) residents of the City of Oxford, at least one of whom shall reside in the Mile Square to be appointed by the Oxford City Council. Appointments shall initially be staggered as to length of term with two (2) members for one (1) year, two (2) members for two (2) years, and two (2) members for three (3) years. Commission members shall thereafter serve for a term of three (3) years without compensation.
- (2) Four (4) Miami University students, appointed by the Associated Student Government, one of whom shall be the Secretary for Off Campus Affairs and two of whom shall serve a two (2) year term.

(b) The Commission shall also have eleven (11) ex-officio members as follows:

- (1) The City Manager or the City Manager's designee;
- (2) The Miami University Vice President for Student Life or designee;
- (3) The Miami University Health and Wellness Administrator or designee;
- (4) One representative of the Oxford Chamber of Commerce;
- (5-6) One member of the Oxford Police Division and one member of the Miami University Police Department;
- (7) One representative of the Talawanda School District;
- (8) One member of the Oxford City Council;
- (9-11) One representative from each of the following Miami University recognized organizations: Interfraternity Council, or PanHellenic Association (alternate each year); Graduate Student Association, and National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC), or Multicultural Greek Council (alternate each year).

Each of the above ex-officio members shall be appointed to serve a one (1) year term.

139.03 ORGANIZATION.

The Secretary of Off-Campus Affairs of the Associated Student Government shall serve as the chairperson of the Commission, and the Commission shall appoint a member to serve as the secretary of the Commission. The Commission may elect other officers as it deems advisable. The Commission shall have full power to organize itself and to determine its own rules, regulations and bylaws. The Commission will meet not less than once per month during the academic year at a regularly scheduled time, date and place.

Proposal Summary:

The developer for Owl's Landing is requesting approval of a Final Subdivision application to allow for the platting of the development's first phase, referred to as "Block A." Of the 86 total single-family lots planned for the entirety of Owl's Landing, 39 are proposed to be platted/developed within this first phase. The remaining 47 units will be platted as part of one or more future phases (i.e. the "Block B" area). Proposed street names are: **Snowy Lane**, **Screech Avenue**, and **Great Horned Drive**.

All platted lots within the City of Oxford are assigned a sequential number for recording purposes. Lots supporting the 39 single-family units in Block A are proposed to be numbered **4079** through **4117**. In addition to these 39 residential lots, 2 additional parcels will be created by the proposed plat: (1) **Lot 4118**, a 4.3-acre parcel intended for future HOA ownership with various easements overtop, and set to contain private streets, sidewalks, a multi-use path, utilities, drainage features and open spaces; and (2) **Lot 4119**, a large 11-acre parcel reserved on the north end of the site to later be developed with additional infrastructure supporting houses in Block B.

Initially, the applicant had proposed leaving the area comprising Lot 4119 as unplatted territory. During staff's review of the plat instrument, it was determined best to include the 11 acres as part of the initial plat in order to effectively create numerous easements that will exist in the area. Easements to be created on Lot 4119 include those for drainage, sewer/water utilities, temporary T-turnarounds at the end of street stubs, and a multi-use path linking to the Community Park property. If the 11 acres comprising Lot 4119 had not been included in the initial plat, this would have required each easement to be considered through separate legal documents and possibly separate Council Ordinances, making documentation and

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approvals more cumbersome. Despite Lot 4119 being reserved primarily for future development phase(s), the developer will nevertheless be constructing a multi-use path to the Community Park at the same time as the rest of the infrastructure for Block A.

Background:

The Owl's Landing project has thus far garnered the following approvals:

- Preliminary Planned Development (PD) & Preliminary Subdivision – approved by Council on January 18, 2022 by Ord. No. 3658
- Construction Drawings – approved administratively on June 13, 2022. Outstanding fee balance (sewer & water capacity benefit charges) must be paid prior to issuance.
- Final Planned Development (PD) – approved by Council on June 21, 2022 by Ord. No. 3682

Discussion and Recommendation:

The Record Plat is the legal instrument to be recorded with the Butler County Recorder which will officially subdivide new lot boundaries and establish necessary easements to support the development. City staff has reviewed the proposed Record Plat instrument and believes it satisfies all prior design-related approval conditions inherent to previous Council approvals. Additional steps will still need to be satisfied administratively prior to the signing of the plat instrument itself by City officials, including: (1) approval of infrastructure bond estimates by the Service Department; and (2) posting of bonds or other acceptable form of financial security for public & private improvements and landscaping. In addition, documentation related to the future HOA including Declaration and Covenants has been reviewed and approved by the Law Director; these documents will also need to be recorded along with plat at the appropriate time.

In keeping with Section 203 of the Oxford Subdivision Regulations, staff recommends the subject application be **approved** subject to the following conditions:

1. The Final Subdivision shall be valid for 1 year from the City Council ordinance date. All recordings shall be completed and construction of the infrastructure improvements started within this 1 year time period.
2. As necessary, the applicant shall update and/or re-file Construction Drawings along with any necessary cost estimates for approval by applicable City departments.
3. The applicant shall file with the City a suitable form of financial security in order to guarantee construction of the improvements. The Record Plat shall not be released to the subdivider for recording until such financial security is accepted by the City.

ORDINANCE NO.

WHEREAS, the City Manager and the Community Development Director recommend Council approve the Final Subdivision Application and Plat attached hereto as Exhibit "A" for Owl's Landing Block A with the following conditions:

1. The Final Subdivision shall be valid for one year from the City Council Ordinance date. All recordings shall be completed and construction of the infrastructure improvements started within this one year time-period.
2. As necessary, the applicant shall update and/or re-file construction drawings along with any necessary cost estimates for approval by applicable City departments.
3. The applicant shall file with the City a suitable form of financial security in order to guarantee the construction of the public improvements. The Record Plat shall not be released to the subdivider for recording until such financial security is accepted by the City.

THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OXFORD, OHIO, HEREBY ORDAINS THAT:

SECTION 1: Council hereby accepts the recommendation of the City Manager and the Community Development Director and further approves the Final Subdivision application and plat for Owl's Landing Block A consisting of 22.014 acres with the conditions set forth above.

The plat must be prepared in accordance with Chapter 1101, Subdivision Regulations and Chapters 1121-1137, Zoning Code of the City of Oxford¹. Scale should not exceed 1" = 100'. Plats containing less than three lots are exempted from the provisions of this section. The following information must appear on the plat:

- D. The lines of adjoining streets and alleys with their widths and names.
- E. All lot lines together with an identification system for all lots and blocks. Lot numbers shall be secured from the County Auditor.
- F. The locations of all building lines and easements provided for public use, services or utilities.
- G. All dimensions, both linear and angular, necessary for locating the boundaries of the subdivision, lots, streets, alleys, easements and any other areas for public or private use. Linear dimensions are to be given to the nearest one hundredth of a foot.
- H. The radii, arcs, lengths, points of tangency and central angles for all curvilinear streets and the radii and lengths for rounded corners.
- I. The location of all survey monuments and benchmarks together with their descriptions. There shall be a minimum of four permanent markers in each subdivision section located at or near the outer corner.
- J. The name of the subdivision, the scale of the plat, points of the compass and name of owner or owners and subdivider if other than the owner and name of the surveyor and engineer preparing the plat.
- K. The certificate of the surveyor attesting to the accuracy of the survey and to the correct locations of all monuments shown.
- L. Any private restrictions and trusteeships and their duration. Should these restrictions or trusteeships be of such length as to make their lettering on the plat impracticable, thus necessitating the preparation of a separate instrument, reference to such instrument shall be made on the plat.
- M. Acknowledgement by the owner or owners of the plat restrictions.
- N. One tracing cloth or comparable material of the approved final plat, for the City records.
- O. The names and record owners of all adjoining subdivisions and the names of recorded owners of adjoining parcels of un-subdivided land.
- P. A receipt showing that all legally due taxes have been paid.
- Q. North arrow, scale and date.
- R. The location of all present property lines, streets, alleys, rights-of-way, buildings, easements, lakes, watercourses, and drainage ways.
- S. Any existing water mains, culverts, water or sewer lines, easements, buildings and streets, within the tract or immediately adjacent thereto.
- T. Size of the tract in acres and lots in square feet and the boundary lines along with the linear measurement thereof.
- U. The proposed location and width of streets, alleys lots and easements.
- V. The seal, registry number and signature of the public surveyor who prepared the plat.
- W. Any portion of the floodplain as delineated by the Butler County Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRM), effective December 17, 2010, must be clearly illustrated and labeled on the plat.

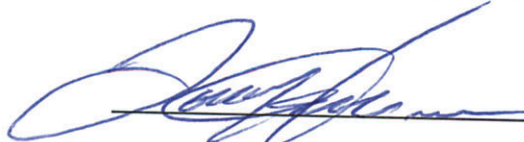

FOR VALUABLE CONSIDERATION, WE, THE UNDERSIGNED ("GRANTOR") DO HEREBY PERMANENTLY GRANT TO DUKE ENERGY OHIO/ONTARIO, INC. AND THEIR PARENT ENTITY (OR ENTITY CONTROLLING BOTH ENTITIES), THEIR RESPECTIVE SUBSIDIARIES OR AFFILIATE ENTITIES AND ANY OTHER PROVIDER OF UTILITY SERVICES ("GRANTEE") THEIR SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, FOREVER, NON-EXCLUSIVE EASEMENTS, AS SHOWN ON THE WITHIN PLAT AND DESIGNATED AS DESIGNATED "UTILITY EASEMENTS" FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, OPERATION, MAINTENANCE, REPAIR, OR REPLACEMENT OF ANY AND ALL NECESSARY FIXTURES FOR THE OVERHEAD OR UNDERGROUND DISTRIBUTION OF GAS, ELECTRIC, TELEPHONE, TELECOMMUNICATIONS OR OTHER UTILITIES ("GRANTEE FACILITIES" OR "FACILITIES") THE GRANTEE SHALL HAVE THE RIGHT OF INGRESS AND EGRESS AND ALSO THE RIGHT TO CUT, TRIM OR REMOVE ANY TREES, UNDERGROWTH OR OVERHANGING BRANCHES WITHIN THE UTILITY EASEMENTS OR IMMEDIATELY ADJACENT THERETO, NO BUILDINGS OR OTHER STRUCTURES MAY BE BUILT WITHIN THE UTILITY EASEMENTS AREA, NOR MAY THE UTILITY EASEMENTS AREA BE PHYSICALLY ALTERED TO 1) REDUCE THE CLEARANCE OF EITHER OVERHEAD OR UNDERGROUND FACILITIES; 2) IMPAIR THE LAND SUPPORT OF GRANTEE FACILITIES; 3) IMPAIR THE ABILITY TO MAINTAIN THE FACILITIES OR 4) CREATE A HAZARD. TO HAVE AND TO HOLD THE EASEMENT FOREVER, I DO ACKNOWLEDGE HAVING THE FULL POWER TO CONVEY THIS UTILITY EASEMENT AND WILL DEFEND THE SAME AGAINST ALL CLAIMS.

ALSO HEREBY GRANTED TO DUKE ENERGY OHIO/ONTARIO, INC. AND ITS SUBSIDIARIES, SUCCESSORS, AND ASSIGNS IS THE RIGHT TO LATEROALLY EXTEND, REPAIR, AND MAINTAIN NATURAL GAS SERVICES TO SERVE INDIVIDUAL LOTS AS CONSTRUCTED BY THE ORIGINAL BUILDER ALLOWING DISTURBANCE ONLY OVER EXISTING SERVICE LINES NECESSARY FOR THE REPAIR ONLY ON THE LOT ON WHICH THE SERVICE IS LOCATED. IT IS UNDERSTOOD THAT THE CITY OF OXFORD WILL NOT BE ABLE TO ISSUE ANY CONNECTION PERMITS OR BUILDING PERMITS UNTIL THE OHIO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY (EPA) HAS APPROVED THE PLANS FOR THE PROPOSED EXTENSIONS OF THE PUBLIC WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS WITHIN THIS SUBDIVISION, UNLESS ON-SITE SYSTEMS ARE PROPOSED AND APPROVED.

ALL BUILDINGS TO BE SERVED BY THE PUBLIC SEWER SYSTEM SHALL BE CONSTRUCTED SO AS TO PROVIDE A MINIMUM OF FOUR (4) FEET VERTICAL SEPARATION BETWEEN THE PUBLIC SANITARY SEWER, AT THE POINT OF CONNECTION, AND THE LOWEST BUILDING LEVEL SERVED BY A GRAVITY SEWER CONNECTION. SHOULD THIS OCCUR, THE PROPERTY OWNER SHALL BE HELD RESPONSIBLE FOR THE PROTECTION AND REPAIR OF AND FOR PROVIDING ACCESS TO ANY CURB STOPS, METER PITS, MANHOLES, CLEANOUTS, ETC. SANITARY SEWER LATERALS, WHICH SHALL INCLUDE ALL PIPE AND APPURTENANCES FROM THE BUILDING TO THE PUBLIC SEWER MAIN, AND THE CONNECTION TO THE PUBLIC SEWER MAIN SHALL BE CONSIDERED PRIVATE AND THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PROPERTY OWNER TO MAINTAIN. THE CONNECTION TO THE SEWER WOULD BE ANY PIPING THAT EXTENDS OUT FROM THE MAIN BARREL OF THE SEWER MAIN.

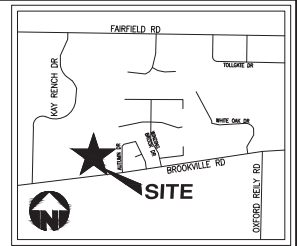
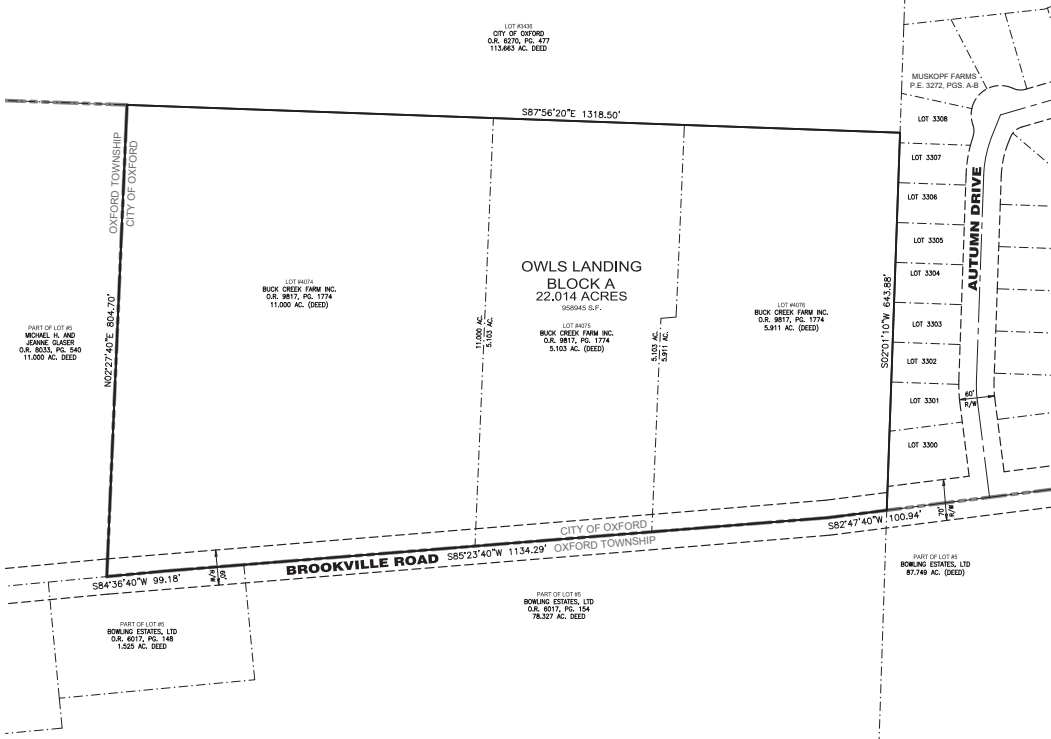

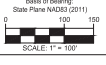
